### **Learning with Nursery Rhymes:**

*Rhymes are an important part of childhood. Their rich language and their rhythms soothed us and inspired us as we were growing up... Take the time to share your favorite rhymes - and watch the learning begin!*

**Language Skills** – Rhymes help children learn word endings and their controlled meter aids children in their beginning reading efforts.

**Thinking Skills** – Rhymes help our brains recall words and facts, thus leading to early success.

**Music Skills** – Rhymes help children learn songs easier.

**Literature** – Nursery rhymes bring classic literature to children at an early age.

**Creativity** – Rhymes enable children to start making up their own rhymes when they are preschoolers.

**Self-Esteem** – Children gain pride and confidence in themselves when they learn how to anticipate the final word in a rhyme.

### **“Climb Aboard the Spaceship” (“Itsy Bitsy Spider”)**

Here comes the countdown, let’s count with all our might!  
5-4-3-2-1-BLAST OFF!

### **“Winter Fingerplay”**
